

Comparing the BACP Ethical Framework 2018 and 2025

The British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy (BACP) Ethical Framework provides the ethical foundation for professional counselling and psychotherapy practice in the UK. The 2018 framework set out clear principles, values, and good practice standards. There is now a 2025 **draft** revision that reflects developments in ethical reasoning, collaborative practice, and contemporary issues (e.g. digital tools and power dynamics).

The framework is currently **not final**, a draft has been sent out for consultation, allowing members to give feedback.

Structural Changes

- 2018 focused on commitment to clients and specific good practice areas (confidentiality, supervision, endings, etc.).
- The 2025 draft moves to a three-part structure:
 - 1. Working ethically within relationships
 - 2. Ethical principles
 - 3. Core responsibilities

This reflects a shift from fixed rules to a more reflective and relational model, encouraging practitioners to explain and justify their reasoning.

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Core Responsibilities vs Good Practice

2018 'Good Practice' areas have been streamlined in the 2025 draft into four Core Responsibilities:

- 1. Build appropriate relationships
- 2. Keep ourselves and those using our services safe
- 3. Understand and act on legal responsibilities
- 4. Deliver services to high professional standards

This removes some duplication and clarifies expectations for ethical reasoning.

Ethical Reasoning and Collaboration

- 2018: Practitioners guided to follow commitments.
- 2025: Practitioners must explain ethical reasoning why decisions were made and how collaboration was attempted.
- Advantage: Recognises the complexity of real-world ethical practice.

Power, Inclusion, and Anti-Oppression

- The 2025 draft introduces Anti-Oppression as an explicit ethical principle.
- Greater emphasis on relational power dynamics, equity, and diversity.
- Stronger expectations around adjustments, non-discrimination, and inclusion.
- Benefit: Aligns ethics with social justice and equality movements.

Legal & Digital Responsibilities

The 2025 draft strengthens expectations around data protection, digital platforms, Al, transparency, consent, and financial responsibility.

Supervision & Accountability

2018: Emphasised supervision as essential to sustaining ethical practice.2025: Maintains this but embeds supervision within ethical reasoning and

accountability.

Final Remarks

The 2025 Ethical Framework as of now:

- Reflects a modern, relational, and reflective approach.
- Emphasises ethical reasoning and collaboration.
- Provides clearer expectations around digital practice and legal compliance.
- Supports practitioners to be accountable and adaptable.

For counsellors and psychotherapists, this means integrating ethical reasoning into daily practice, recording decisions transparently, and staying current with digital, legal, and social developments.
